Location Geography	 Where the plains meet the Rockies in the heart of the USA, Colorado is 270,000 sq kms of wonder, making it the 8th largest state in the US. It is bordered to the north by Wyoming, to the south by New Mexico, at the southwest corner by Arizona, to the east by Nebraska, Kansas, and Oklahoma, and to the west by Utah. Discover Colorado's stunning natural landscape. From the highest sand
	dunes in North America to mountain peaks over 14,000 feet, Colorado has one of the most unique and varied natural landscape in the entire nation. As you travel through the state, you'll see emerald green forests, fields of vibrant wildflowers as far as the eye can see, picturesque mountain lakes, abundant grasslands and rich red rock formations. You'll find many places to enjoy Colorado's vast natural beauty. There are:
	four national parks,
	five national monuments and
	41 state parks waiting to be explored.
	If you're looking for a beautiful drive, Colorado is also home to 25 scenic and historic byways, noted for their distinct qualities. They include ghost towns, ancient ruins, alpine tundra, some of the oldest trains in the West and much more.
	The Rocky Mountains within Colorado contain 53 peaks that are 14,000 feet (4,267 m) or higher elevation, known as fourteeners. The mountains are timbered with conifers and aspens to the tree line, at an elevation of about 12,140 feet (3,700 m) in southern Colorado to about
	10,500 feet (3,200 m) in northern Colorado; above this only alpine vegetation grows.
	Colorado is split into seven regions: Greater Denver, the Front Range, Northeast, Southeast, South Central, Southwest and Northwest.
Name	The state was named after the Spanish word "Colorado," which means "reddish colored" that presumably refers to the red sandstone formations in the area or reddish brown color of the Colorado River.
Population	The State's population is nearly 5 million and the Denver-Aurora-Boulder Combined Statistical Area is home to nearly 3 million people, so containing 60% of the state's population.
Language	English, but 17% Hispanic. Colorado's Hispanic presence is one of the largest in the U.S.—only five states have more Hispanics per capita
Currency	US Dollars; the current exchange rate at June 1 2010 is 94 cents US to the Canadian Dollar
Tipping	The custom of tipping is a common practice in Colorado: 15% to 20% for waiters; 10% to 15% for taxi drivers; \$1 per bag for bellmen. Occasionally gratuities are automatically added to restaurant checks, but not usually.
Government	Like all U.S. states, Colorado's constitution provides for three branches



	of government: the legislative, executive, and judicial branches. The governor heads the state's executive branch. The Colorado Supreme Court is the highest judicial body in the state. The state legislative body is the Colorado General Assembly, which is made up of two houses, the House of Representatives and the Senate. The House has 65 members and the Senate has 35. Currently, Democrats control both chambers of the General Assembly.
Documentation	Passports are now required for Canadian visitors arriving by air and land. An enhanced provincial driving license will also be an alternative if you are driving to Colorado.
Time zone	Mountain Time Zone, 2 hours behind Ontario and Quebec
Health	Excellent services are available but ensure that you have travelers health insurance as health costs in the US can be very high Remember to drink more water to counteract the effects of altitude
Safety tips	 Colorado is relatively safe for the tourist. One should use the same precautions as when traveling anywhere - try not to travel alone and avoid deserted areas at night. In Denver's wild days, famous gunfighter Bat Masterson was employed as a guard at several of the city's saloons, but today, downtown Denver is one of the safest cities in America. Denver is ranked by the F.B.I. as one of the safest downtowns in America.

CLIMATE	
General climate	In summer, dry relative humidity makes Denver feel cool and comfortable, offering natural air conditioning. Fall is a particularly delightful time to visit the city and make day excursions to the mountains to view the colorful changing of the aspens, an event that takes place from mid-September until mid-October
Today's weather	Denver is 25C and mostly sunny whilst Mesa Verde is 27C and sunny (as at 1 st June 2010)
Best time to visit	Genuinely a four-season destination: winter is the mecca for skiers, spring is the wildflower season, summer temperatures are tempered by the varying altitudes and fall is a colour explosion!

GETTING AROUND	
Getting There	Denver International Airport is the only major airport to be built in the U.S. in the last 25 years. The current facility can accommodate 50 million passengers a year without any additional construction. It is the USA's sixth-busiest airport and the 11th-busiest in the world. The airport is easily accessed by interstate highways and is conveniently located less than 35 minutes from downtown Denver by car, shuttle buses, public transportation or taxis. I personally rate it as one of the most traveller-friendly airports in North America.



	Air Canada offer the only non-stop service from Toronto and Montreal to Denver in association with its Star Alliance partner United Airlines. Cities	 website at www.aircanada.com Denver Population: 557,000. Elevation: 5280 feet (One mile high!) Denver is near the mountains, not in them. Denver is located on high rolling plains, 12 miles east of what locals call the "foothills," a series of gentle mountains that climb to 11,000 feet. Just beyond is the "Front Range of the Rocky Mountains," a series of formidable snowcapped peaks that rise to 14,000 feet. Denver might not be in the mountains, but the mountains dominate Denver. There are 200 named peaks visible from the city, including 32 that soar to 13,000 feet and above. Denver really is exactly one mile high. By an amazing stroke of good luck, there is a step on the State Capitol Building that is exactly 5,280 feet above sea level – one mile high. Denver is one of America's most beautiful and most fun cities. And it's a lively city with a great love of the outdoors. Down every Denver street there are mountain panoramas. Discover sports stadiums, three hundred restaurants, bars and brewpubs, a restored historic district, museums, galleries, shopping, performing arts and more. Plus it's a great gateway to all that Colorado has to offer. Weather: Denver has 300 days of sunshine a year. Located east of a major mountain range, Denver has a mild, dry and sunny climate with more annual hours of sun than San Diego or Miami Beach. In winter, Denver is dryer than Phoenix with an average daily high of 45 degrees in February. Golf courses remain open all year and have been played as many as 30 days in January. Denver receives only 14 inches of precipitation a year – about the same as Los Angeles. Name: In hopes of gaining political favors, local boosters in 1859 named the frontier mining camp on the South Platte River "Denver" after Kansas Territorial Governor James Denver. They never received any favors by the time they named the town, Denver had already resigned. It was years before James Denver saw the mining camp named after him. He was reportedly no



of which now house restaurants, shops and hotels. Denver is one of the few cities in history that was not on a road, railroad, lake, navigable river or body of water when it was founded. Denver just happened to be where the first few flakes of gold were found in 1858 and it was here that the first camp was made. The first permanent structure was a saloon. Historic Buildings : The 26 square block Lower Downtown Historic District (LoDo) is the largest concentration of Victorian and turn-of-the-century buildings in the nation. The Colorado State Capitol stands a mile above sea level with a plaque on the 13th step to mark the spot that is 5,280 feet (1,609 m) high – exactly one mile high. The dome is covered with 200 ounces of pure gold and offers a beautiful view from the rotunda of the entire Front Range, from Pikes Peak, all the way north to the Wyoming border, a distance of more than 240 km Denver Parks : Denver has more than 200 parks within the city and 20,000 acres of parks in the nearby mountains, including spectacular Red Rocks Amphitheatre. Red Rocks Amphitheatre is a 9,000-seat natural outdoor arena carved out of huge, 500-foot (152 m) high, red
sandstone cliffs, all overlooking Denver and the plains. Highest Educated City: Denver is the most educated city in the United States. Denver has the greatest percentage of college graduates of any major metropolitan area in the country.

	Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad: Perhaps the most famous of them allIn its heyday, more than \$300 million in gold and silver were hauled on the narrow-gauge tracks. Authentically restored 1880 passenger cars will sweep you into days gone by and abandoned mine sites and virgin forests, while chugging along the wild Animas River up into the San Juan Mountains, with a stop at the gold mining era town of Silverton, before returning to Durango. http://www.durangotrain.com
	Cripple Creek and Victor Narrow Gauge Railroad : Enjoy a four-mile round-trip through historic Victor and past old mining sites, then back to the gold-rush town of Cripple Creek, now known for its low-stakes gambling as well as its restored Victorian-era town.



	Cumbres & Tolec Scenic Railroad : The longest and highest narrow-gauge line in North America, it stretches 64 miles/103 kilometers from Antonito, Colorado to Chama, New Mexico. From an open-air sightseeing coach, you can take in the sights and enjoy on-train refreshments.
	Georgetown Loop Historic Mining and Railroad Park : You can hop on at either the Georgetown or Silver Plume Depot; this historic narrow-gauge railroad loops through both as it makes its way through Clear Creek Canyon. Originally built in 1884, the railroad is a major attraction in Georgetown, and it's easy to see why as you gaze out from open-air or covered cars at the rugged wilderness going by.
	Leadville, Colorado and Southern Railroad: Nestled in the alpine valley under the shadow of Colorado's highest peak, Leadville was settled and developed by miners and merchants in the 1800s. Discover the mining and railroad history of Leadville while enjoying the breathtaking views of the Arkansas River Valley as you travel to the Continental Divide.
	Manitou and Pikes Peak Cog Railway: The world's highest cog (rack) railroad, this line takes passengers to the 14,110-foot/4,300-meter summit of Pikes Peak, and its one-of-a-kind views.
	Rio Grande Scenic Railroad : Colorado's newest scenic train offers steam engine rides out of Alamosa. Enjoy hundreds of miles of historic rail, through mountain valleys and passes.
	Royal Gorge Scenic Railway : The little train with big views of the spectacular Royal Gorge. An incline railway with open-air cars allow for breathtaking vistas of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and Royal Gorge region on this three-mile, 30-minute round-trip ride.
	Royal Gorge Route Railroad: This 1950s-era rail line forges through one of America's most spectacular canyons. Travel in comfortable cars (including three recently added historic observation dome cars) as you chug along the bottom of the gorge and look up 1,200 feet/366 meters to the Royal Gorge Bridge spanning the top.
Car Rental	There's no better way to see Colorado, than from the open road. Whether you're looking for a car, truck, 4x4 or ATV, there are plenty of companies around the state that provide rental vehicles of all shapes and sizes.
Buses	There is excellent bus service both within Denver and throughout the



Kids	One of the most popular sites to visit in Denver is the famous United States Mint , where more than 20 billion coins are produced each year. That's 40 million-plus coins every day! A terrific family outing, the Mint offers tours that begin with the history of money and instruction on the coin stamping process. Watch the faces of the kids as they see the 60 large, high-speed presses and the machines that count, sort and bag the coins. In the basement of the Mint, you'll see the second largest deposits of gold bullion in the U.S. after Fort Knox — an estimated \$100 billion worth of solid gold bars.
	Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park: www.glenwoodcaverns.com At the top of Iron Mountain, near Glenwood Springs, visitors can tour Glenwood Caverns and Historic Fairy Caves, recognized as one of the leading family cave tours in the country. The Cave Tour is a one-hour guided walking tour appropriate for most people. The Wild Tour is a three-hour, guided, an on-your-belly adventure tour that gives a visitor the opportunity to explore the rarely visited areas of Glenwood Caverns. There's also a great selection of attractions and thrill experiences up there, from Alpine Coaster to Giant Canyon Swing to Bungee Trampoline to the 4D Ride Theater. Teens	Zapata Ranch 5305 State Highway 150, Mosca, Colorado 81146 719-378-2356 Owned by The Nature Conservancy and managed through a one-of-a-kind partnership with the Duke and Janet Phillips Family- a third-generation ranching family. The ranch is a 103,000-acre cattle, bison and guest ranch. It borders the Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve , the newest National Park in the United States. The high desert grasslands, alpine forests, wetlands, sand dunes, creeks and lush meadows offer one of the most scenic and ecologically diverse landscapes in the United States. The ranch and surrounding valley is a wildlife mecca and is home to thousands of elk, bison, deer, coyotes, birds and many other species. This is a family-oriented ranch; children are welcome, but must be over 12 years old to participate in the Ranch Experience Program. Exceptions are made for advanced youth riders (no younger than eight



	 years of age). Families are encouraged to participate in activities together and accompany their young children on rides. But at times when adults want to ride together, they have youth programs to allow children to have an enriching experience as well. http://www.zranch.org Denver offers two gigantic water parks: Water World, the largest aqua park in the nation, has wave pools, surfing, tubing, rapids and more. Elitch Gardens is two parks in one with 56 thrill rides and a complete water park. Denver is also the capital of day trip adventures. In just an hour or so from downtown you can go river rafting through a 1,000-foot high canyon, ride a narrow gauge steam locomotive over a 100-foot trestle, hike among towering red rock formations, fly fish in Gold Medallion streams, see elk in a national park, gamble in Old West mining towns or shop in beautiful mountain resort villages.
Romance	Spas: Colorado is home to dozens of hot springs and spas where visitors can soothe sore muscles after a full day of white-water rafting, skiing, ice climbing, hiking or mountain biking. Ranging from rustic to refined, Colorado's hot springs are celebrated for their high mineral content and resulting therapeutic qualities. You'll find the world's largest hot springs pool in Glenwood Springs and the world's deepest hot mineral spring in Pagosa Springs. In addition, Colorado boasts several "man made" spas within its collection of luxury hotel and resort spas. Many of the spas find inspiration in the state's hot springs culture, introducing architectural water features and hydrotherapy treatments that reflect an awareness of and appreciation for water's therapeutic qualities. In 1898, when the Boulder Valley stretched wide and mostly unspoiled from the Front Range of the Rocky Mountains to the far horizon of the plains, residents of the young community of Boulder began preserving land. Their first purchase was the alfalfa fields and apple orchards planted by the Batchelder family, the lovely area now known as Chautauqua Park. With more than 960 species in Colorado, our abundant wildlife can be viewed in hundreds of designated areas around the state. You'll also find towering aspen trees, the Rocky Mountain Columbine (state flower) and countless other forms of plant life throughout the state's diverse terrain.
	Denver Zoo 2300 Steele St. Denver www.denverzoo.org The Denver Zoo, located in City Park, spans more than 75 acres and is home to nearly 4,000 animals including rare Amur leopards, okapi, black rhinoceros, elephants, vampire bats, orangutan, Komodo dragons and more. The 113-year-old Denver Zoo is consistently among the most popular paid attractions in the Denver metropolitan area and among the top 10 zoos in the country.
Parks	Mesa Verde National Park : The Mesa Verde landscape in the American southwest is considered to be the type site of the prehistoric Ancestral Puebloan culture, which lasted for some nine hundred years from c 450 to 1300, on this plateau in south-west Colorado at an altitude



of more than 2600 meters (8,500 feet). There is a great concentration of spectacular Pueblo Indian dwellings. Some 600 'cliff dwellings' have been recorded within Mesa Verde National Park, including the famous multi-storey ones such as Cliff Palace, Balcony House, and Square Tower House, built of sandstone and mud mortar, and an additional 4100 archaeological sites have been discovered. New discoveries are routinely made. The exceptional archaeological sites of the Mesa Verde landscape provide eloquent testimony to the ancient cultural traditions of Native American tribes. They represent a graphic link between the past and present ways of life of the Puebloan Peoples of the American south-west. In 1978, Mesa Verde National Park was named a World Heritage Site in recognition of its exceptional archaeological relevance – including its spectacular cliff dwellings tucked into the sandstone alcoves of its steep-walled canyons. These fascinating cliff dwellings were built by the Ancestral Puebloans (previously known as the Anasazi) in the late 12th and 13th centuries. Guided tours are available for park visitors. Additionally, many prehistoric villages and archaeological sites found on mesa tops, provide a link to North America's prehistoric past.
Great Sand Dunes NP : Nowhere else in the United States do mountains of sand stand higher than here in the Rocky Mountains. The tallest dune towers 750 feet high at an elevation of 8,700 feet above sea level. The entire dune field itself encompasses 30-square miles within the 150,000-acre park. Aside from the dunes, this national park provides ample camping and hiking opportunities. Four-wheel driving is also available along the challenging Medano Pass — an off-road route that stretches roughly 40kms from within park to the town of Gardner. Explore the tallest dunes in North America. Whether hiking, sliding, or exploring in a dunes wheelchair, the Great Sand Dunes are a unique wilderness area protected for all to enjoy. http://www.nps.gov/grsa/index.htm
Rocky Mountain National Park : This park encompasses the pure and natural beauty of the region. With high-mountain lakes and streams, peaks more than14,000 feet, thick evergreen forests and thousands of acres of wildlife, this park conjures up what most people imagine when they think of the Rockies. Open from Memorial Day to late autumn, Trail Ridge Road — topping out at 12,183 feet — is the highest continuous paved road in the United States. And it one of the most breath-taking rod trips I have ever experienced.

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Historical Sites	Fort Garland Museum: Visit this restored frontier adobe fort, built in 1858 to create a military presence in the San Luis Valley. The fort was once commanded by the
	Garden of the Gods: The Garden of the Gods is a public park located in Colorado Springs. It contains red sandstone hogback formations, similar to the Red Rocks south of Denver. The name Colorado is said to come from the color of this sandstone. The hogbacks are ridges of sandstone, whose layers are tilted. Instead of lying horizontally, some layers are even vertically oriented. Each hogback can range up to several hundred feet long, some as tall as 50 feet from ground level. Their shapes indeed resemble the backs and spines of a pig. Entrance to the park is free, according to the wish of Charles Elliott Perkins, whose children donated the land to the city of Colorado Springs in 1909. It contains numerous trails for hiking, walking, mountain biking and horseback riding. Many of the most popular trails are paved, in an effort to combat the rampant erosion of the park's land caused by its numerous visitors.

Gardens	Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park: No other canyon in North America combines the narrow opening, sheer walls, and startling depths offered by the Black Canyon of the Gunnison. There are hiking and ranger-guided programs. The Black Canyon of the Gunnison's unique and spectacular landscape was formed slowly by the action of water and rock scouring down through hard Proterozoic crystalline rock. The South Rim Drive is 12kms from Tomichi Point to High Point, and has 12 overlooks. Most are reached by walking a short trail. Allow 2-3 hours to view several overlooks. Those with limited time should consider stopping at Gunnison Point, Chasm View, Painted Wall and Sunset View. The South Rim Visitor Center, which features exhibits on the canyon, is located at Gunnison Point and has exhibits, introductory film, publications and Junior Ranger program for kids. <u>http://www.nps.gov/blca/index.htm</u> Denver has 200 parks with lakes, flower gardens and mountain views – the largest city park system in the nation.
