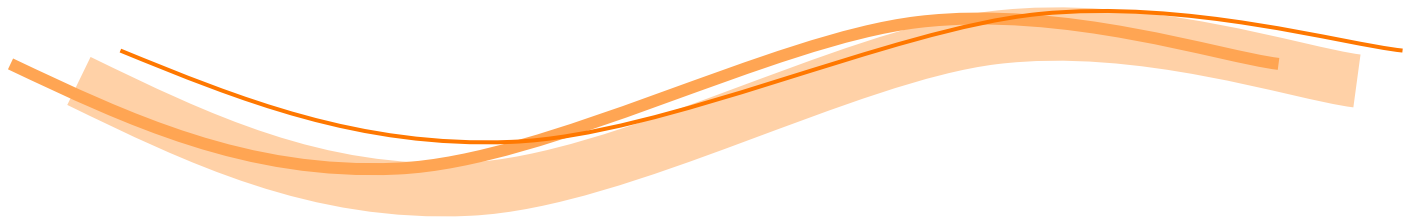

DO SOMETHING NEW

Revel Entertainment's brand new resort headlines an impressive array of entertainment options for visitors. Located on the Boardwalk at Connecticut Avenue, Revel spans 6.3 million square feet and stands 47 stories high above the bustling Boardwalk. Revel offers an impressive 130,000 square foot gaming floor with more than 100 gaming tables and 160,000 square feet of indoor and 90,000 square feet of outdoor flexible meeting/event space. Dynamic entertainment venues include a one-of-a-kind Burlesque nightclub and elegant, unique and classic dining options featuring award-winning chefs from across the country.

Also new to AC, the **Golden Nugget** purchased the Trump Marina and invested more than \$150 million into the property. It sits right at the Frank S. Farley Marina with expansive views of the Atlantic City skyline. The Golden Nugget features the Landry trademark restaurants like Vic and Anthony's, Charhouse and many more ways to gamble, wine and dine and take advantage of the waterside location.

Resorts Casino Hotel is adding a Margaritaville complex to the property in May 2013. The changes will transform Resorts into a destination appealing to visitors yearning for an island adventure.

Tanger Outlets recently-completed a \$15 million, third phase of expansion to The Walk shopping mall that has added more than 45,000 square feet of outlet shopping. New retail establishments include Columbia Sportswear, Zumiez, Puma Outlet, Coach Men's, Chico's, Hanes Brands and more.

Using Boardwalk Hall's historic facade as a gigantic canvas, the light show features the latest 3-D video-mapping technology, stunning animation, and an original music score. So you can experience a mix of orchestral, indie pop and electronic music set to the sounds of the city on the Atlantic. Shows begin at dusk and run every ½ hour until 2 a.m. nightly. A new Duality show, "Boardwalk Beat" will debut on the historic façade in Spring, 2013.

From thrilling rides and breathtaking helicopter tours at Steel Pier to parasailing, fishing and dolphin watching from Gardner's Basin - fun lurks behind every corner in AC! Shop for kitschy souvenirs and eat fun Boardwalk fare like salt water taffy, funnel cakes, cotton candy, popcorn and peanuts. The sights and smells and sounds of the Atlantic City Boardwalk are unparalleled.

DO WORLD CLASS ENTERTAINMENT

Entertainment's biggest and most successful acts routinely take to the stage and perform under the bright lights at Atlantic City's 12 casinos and at Historic Boardwalk Hall. The **House of Blues** at the Showboat provides an intimate and electric setting for rock n roll and various other musical genre concerts. When the sun goes down, the action is just heating up as numerous night clubs, such as Mixx at Borgata, Dusk at Caesars, Boogie Nights at Tropicana, Casbah at Trump Taj Mahal and The Pool at Harrah's, allow patrons the opportunity to let their hair down, and dance and party until the wee hours of the morning.

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	<p>Dishes from all sorts of ethnic backgrounds, such as Mexican, American, Italian, Vietnamese, Asian, Indian, Southern, Cuban, Mediterranean and more, can be found at dozens of restaurants throughout the city and along the Boardwalk.</p> <p>DO GOLF</p> <p>From seaside links with breathtaking views to parkland-style fairways nestled in the heart of the pinelands, the Atlantic City area is home to many of the finest public golf courses on the US East Coast.</p>
Location	On the eastern seaboard of the United States, in the state of New Jersey, south of New York, east of Philadelphia and north of Washington. Located in the heart of the northeast and within easy driving distance of Quebec and Ontario.
Geography	Atlantic City is on a barrier island off the Atlantic coast of New Jersey, connected by an array of bridges to the mainland and other barrier islands.
Name	In 1853 the final plans for the railroad included the decision for the city's official name. "Atlantic City" met with unanimous approval against early favorites such as Bath, Seabeach, and Surfing.
Population	Atlantic City today has a year-round population of 40,000
Language	English
Currency	US Dollars. Current exchange rate as at 18 May 2013 is \$1 Cdn = 97 cents US, so we are close to parity.
Tipping	The custom of tipping is a common practice in Atlantic City: 15% to 20% for waiters; 10% to 15% for taxi drivers; \$1 per bag for bellmen. Occasionally gratuities are automatically added to restaurant checks, but not usually.
Dress	Clothing styles in Atlantic City are as varied as any other resort city in the world. Styles of dress ranging from comfortable and casual to elegant and stylish will be seen in all parts of the city. Air conditioning is a way of life during NJ summers, making all clothing comfortable indoors.
Documentation	Passports are required for Canadian visitors to the United States.
Time zone	Eastern Time Zone, as Toronto and Montreal
Health	Excellent services available but ensure that you have travellers health insurance as health costs in the US can be very high.
Safety tips	Sensible travellers' precautions should be adopted, but this destination is considered a safe city to visit.

CLIMATE	
General climate	Spring and fall are delightful with lots of sunshine and pleasant

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	temperatures; summers can be hot and sometimes humid; winters are mild and damp. Hurricane Sandy struck Atlantic City on October 29, 2012, causing major flooding and damage from which the city has entirely recovered.
Today's weather	23 C with sunny periods (18 May 2013)
Best time to visit	Spring, summer and fall are all lovely times to visit Atlantic City. Perhaps the best time to come to Atlantic City is during shoulder season – early fall (September, October), when the crowds are gone and the room rates are extremely attractive.

GETTING THERE	
Driving to AC	Montreal to AC is 780 kms or 8 hours via I-87 to Garden State Pky. Toronto to AC is 870 kms or 9 hours through Buffalo via 476 then PA into NJ An estimated 200,000 to 250,000 people from Canada visit Atlantic City every year. Many Quebec and Ontario Vacationers go further south to the beaches and do not realise that AC has something for everyone and can make it a stop on the way for a day or two.
Flying	The best route is to fly direct from either Montreal or Toronto to Philadelphia. US air has the most options and takes approx. 1½ hours. Air Canada has several options connecting in Toronto with one stop. There are several easy methods to get from Philadelphia to Atlantic City via train, bus or rental car. You can also fly direct into the Atlantic City Airport with Spirit which has direct flights into Atlantic City from Boston, Detroit and Chicago. Prices range from \$ 400 or less. Atlantic City International Airport www.acairport.com is 16 kms from downtown. Atlantic City Airport Taxi www.actaxi.com can whisk you to your hotel from the terminal for \$25
Cities	Philadelphia is only just over an hour away and has a plethora of historical and contemporary attractions.
Distances	Atlantic City is 100 kms from Philadelphia, 220 kms from New York, and 310 kms from Washington, DC.
Ferries	Cape May Lewes Ferry offers a 70-minute ferry ride between Cape May, New Jersey and Lewes, Delaware. Operates year round. http://www.capemaylewesferry.com
Trains	New York-Atlantic City Train Service, dubbed “ ACES ” (Atlantic City Express Service), is planned to start with tree roundtrips on Fridays, eight roundtrips on Saturdays and seven roundtrips on Sundays. The route offers direct, one-stop service from Penn Station to Newark; from Newark along Amtrak’s Northeast Corridor lines; switching to NJ Transit’s Atlantic City line without interruption to the rail station at the Atlantic City Convention Center (estimated time 2 hrs 40 minutes)
Car Rental	All major car rental companies have offices in town

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<p>Buses</p>	<p>A car isn't necessary in Atlantic City, so if you prefer not to drive, bus service is available from Philadelphia and New York (trip time: about 1 1/2 hr. from Philly, 2 hr. from New York) via Greyhound www.greyhound.com and NJ Transit ; www.njtransit.com . Buses arrive at the safe and relatively new bus station adjacent to the Convention Center at Atlantic and Michigan avenues, 2 blocks from the Boardwalk.</p> <p>Public Transportation - Within the city everything is readily accessible to public transportation on New Jersey Transit buses. The ever popular 13 passenger jitneys move the entire length of Pacific Avenue, parallel to Atlantic City's world famous Boardwalk, to the Marina District and to the Convention Center.</p> <p>You can also catch a ride in an old-fashioned rolling chair. These shaded surreys are rolled up and down the length of the Boardwalk by experienced guides, who are out soliciting riders day and night.</p>
<p>Passes</p>	<p>Most Atlantic City casinos offer bus packages, which often include such value-added premiums as \$20 in coins or free meals, from major northeast cities - including New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, D.C., and Pittsburgh - aboard casino-direct charters. They generally cater to day visitors who want to come in to gamble for 12 hours or so without the expense of a hotel room. Call the casinos directly or check your local paper to learn about current offers.</p>

Located on Route 40/322 in Egg Harbor Township, this 20-acre park has over fifty storybook attractions depicting children's stories, with unlimited rides. Teens	<p>Venture to the shore for beach activities, including: surfing (permitted on three designated surfing beaches) with surfing lessons available; kayaking and windsurfing at the Jackson Avenue beach; beach volleyball; boogie boarding; jet-skiing; and fishing.</p>

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	Atlantic City's ocean-side location provides ample opportunity for day cruises, sailing, fishing, boating, canoe or kayak rental. Nearby local, state and national parks such as Atlantic County Park at Lake Lenape, Edwin B. Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge and Bass River State Forest offer scenic views, hiking trails, bird-watching and log cabins.

UNIQUES	
Surprising	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Atlantic City is the site of the world's first boardwalk. - Monopoly was created in 1933 by Pennsylvanian Charles Darrow, who used the streets of Atlantic City as the basis for his game board. - In 1883, salt water taffy was conceived in Atlantic City by David Bradley. The traditional story is that Bradley's shop was flooded after a major storm, soaking his taffy with salty Atlantic Ocean water. He sold some "salt water taffy" to a girl, who proudly walked down to the beach to show her friends. Bradley's mother was in the back of the store when the sale was made, and loved the name, and so salt water taffy was born.
History	<p>The early 1800s saw Atlantic City as a desolate island known then only as Absegami, the Native American word for "Little Sea Water." It was nothing but sand, marshes and wilderness.</p> <p>The earliest settlers were two "less than neighborly" hermits: Jeremiah Leeds, grandfather to the famed Jersey Devil, and an early entrepreneur from Philadelphia, civil engineer Dr. Jonathan Pitney. Dr. Pitney saw the potential of the area and started talking it up as an ideal spot to recuperate from the woes of the city, by taking in the healthful salt air. The route of a proposed railway from Camden to the yet unnamed resort in the 1850s fascinated investors, who stepped right up with their money in hand.</p> <p>In 1854 Atlantic City's first municipal charter was approved and July of that year saw the first two and a half-hour train ride steaming out of Camden, with much celebration and hoopla.</p> <p>The rest is history. Grand hotels grew from small cottages, a walkway of boards to keep the sand out of the hotels became a world-famous Boardwalk, giant entertainment piers gave birth to publicity stunts and the city kept evolving into one of the world's best-known seaside resorts.</p> <p>Step into any historical museum throughout Atlantic and Cape May Counties and be instantly transported back to the times of "ocean</p>

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	madness," thrilling mechanical marvels on the bustling Boardwalk, the evolution of Miss America, early life and myths of the Pine Barrens, gala dances in seaside hotel ballrooms and Victorian life on the Cape.

Must Sees	No tour of Atlantic City is complete without a walk on the world-famous Atlantic City Boardwalk . The world's most famous Boardwalk was built in 1870, and there is still nothing like it in the world. Lined with shops, restaurants and food stands, casinos and more, it's a 7km long people-watcher's delight.

Arts	<p>The Atlantic City area is full of history and locations to celebrate it. Among them: The Atlantic City Historical Museum, the Civil Rights Garden, New Jersey Korean War Memorial and Atlantic City Art Center. Other notable sites off the Boardwalk include: the famous Absecon Lighthouse, the Atlantic City Aquarium Ocean Life Center and abundant antiquing, nearby historic villages, lush gardens, wineries, zoos and more.</p> <p>The Atlantic City Art Center, located on Garden Pier at New Jersey Avenue, houses three different art galleries. The center hosts monthly exhibits of unique artwork by noted national and regional artists and artisans. Its galleries feature paintings, paper sculpture, drawings, etchings and more.</p> <p>The Noyes Museum of Art, located near the entrance to the Edwin B. Forsythe Wildlife Refuge. It offers a rustic setting to view noteworthy exhibits of fine art, folk art and crafts.</p>
Music	<p>On Mississippi Avenue in Atlantic City is Dante Hall Theater of the Arts. The beautiful 250-seat theater features plays, concerts and other events. It's the perfect way to end the day in Atlantic City. For tickets and information about upcoming events; visit www.dantehall.org</p>
Films	<p>Visit The Quarter at Tropicana and take in a movie experience with the only IMAX Theater in Atlantic City. The theatre is equipped to show 2D and 3D movies as well as the latest Hollywood event. The hit TV series "Boardwalk Empire" is set in Atlantic City.</p>
Museums	<p>No visit to Atlantic City is complete without a trip to the Atlantic City Historical Museum on Garden Pier at New Jersey Avenue, where 150 years of seaside mania are showcased, and faces of the past come to life. Mr. Peanut, the unmistakable character who greeted visitors outside the Planters Peanut store on the Boardwalk for many years, welcomes you. The entertaining historical video called "Boardwalk Ballyhoo" gives a glimpse of famous Atlantic City memories, such as the high diving horse plunging from his platform and splashing into the ocean to the thrill of the crowd. Visitors can view a rotating exhibition of Atlantic City photographs and see Atlantic City memorabilia including Miss America items and Heinz pickle pins, which are still given out at the museum more than a century after their first appearance on the Boardwalk.</p> <p>Now over a hundred years old, Lucy The Elephant was originally built</p>

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	<p>to lure real estate investors to South Atlantic City (now Margate). Since then she has served as a restaurant and even a house. She was restored in the 1970s and moved to her current location at Washington and Atlantic Avenues in Margate, where she has resided ever since as a museum. You can climb to the “howdah” on Lucy’s back for a panoramic view of the ocean, beach and surrounding area. http://www.lucytheelephant.org</p> <p>Ripley’s Believe It or Not! Museum, located on Atlantic City’s Boardwalk, features the world’s most unusual, fascinating and bizarre exhibits. Open seven days a week from 10 a.m. till about 11 p.m. Admission is \$16 for adults and children 13 and up, \$13 for seniors and \$10 for children ages 5-12. <p>Festivals</p>	<p>Atlantic City Airshow – June 26, 2013 For over a decade, the Atlantic City Airshow has been a tradition in Atlantic City, and the 2013 Airshow is getting ready for takeoff on Wednesday, June 26, 2013. Show organizers in Atlantic City are working to pack this year’s show with amazing stunts and breathtaking aeronautic maneuvers by a host of exciting commercial acts. The Airshow will be the centrepiece of week-long “sand, sea and air” activities that will kick off the summer season with many free events along the Boardwalk. Free beaches, combined with great hotel deals and packages, are all designed to make this the perfect time to DO AC.</p> <p>Atlantic City Food and Wine festival: July 25 – July 28 2013 2012 was arguably one of the strongest celebrity chef line ups to date, last year's culinary superstars included: Food Network's Tyler Florence and Anne Burrell, Robert Irvine, Aaron Sanchez, and New Jersey's favorite pastry chef, Buddy Valastro. A gastronome favorite and newbie to the Atlantic City Food and Wine Festival was Andrew Zimmern, an exciting addition. The lineup was stellar and packed with some of the favourite television culinary greats. This year the Atlantic City Food and Wine Festival will commence on Thursday, July 25, with events running through Sunday, July 28. <p>Beaches</p>	<p>The beach is where it all started: pristine sand with healthy salt air and a developer who saw the promise it held. Now Atlantic City is one of the world’s favourite destinations and the beach differentiates it from any</p>

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	<p>other gaming locale. During the summer, the beaches are guarded by the country's first lifeguard organization and the water is safe thanks to a stringent State water quality program. Millions of guests stroll, ride a bicycle or tour the Boardwalk on a distinctive rolling chair. The first permanent Boardwalk was built in 1870 as a way to keep sand off of hotel carpets. Today, the Boardwalk is more than seven kilometers in length and 60 feet across at its widest points. The present structure is seated on concrete and steel pilings and constructed of thousands of two-by-fours. The boards are replaced approximately every 12 years due to the immense foot traffic.</p>
<p>Wildlife</p>	<p>The Marine Mammal Stranding Center in Brigantine rehabilitates stranded sea animals including whales, dolphins, seals and turtles. It offers public visiting hours and features an animal husbandry museum and other educational exhibits. Admission is free; donations are appreciated. http://www.mmsc.org</p> <p>The Atlantic City Aquarium in Historic Gardner's Basin features touch tanks, sea life exhibits and educational seminars about the marine life of the Atlantic Coastal area. The Aquarium is open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. http://www.oceanlifecenter.com</p> <p>The Edwin B. <p>Lighthouses</p>	<p>The Absecon Lighthouse at Rhode Island and Pacific Avenues in Atlantic City is a historic structure designed by Civil War General</p>

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	<p>George Meade and built in 1857. Visitors who climb the 228-step structure are rewarded with a bird's eye view of Atlantic City's dazzling skyline and the back bay area. A photographer's delight, the lighthouse re-opened to the public in 1999. It is the tallest lighthouse in New Jersey. There is no charge for visiting the ground floor museum and gift shop.
